- 1Co 9:6 Or do only Barnabas and I not have a right to refrain from working?
- 1Co 9:13 Do you not know that those who perform sacred services eat the *food* of the temple, *and* those who attend regularly to the altar have their share from the altar?
- 1Co 9:15-18 But I have used none of these things. And I am not writing these things so that it will be done so in my case; for it would be better for me to die than have any man make my boast an empty one. 16 For if I preach the gospel, I have nothing to boast of, for I am under compulsion; for woe is me if I do not preach the gospel. 17 For if I do this voluntarily, I have a reward; but if against my will, I have a stewardship entrusted to me. 18 What then is my reward? That, when I preach the gospel, I may offer the gospel without charge, so as not to make full use of my right in the gospel.
- 2Co 11:7-9 Or did I commit a sin in humbling myself so that you might be exalted, because I preached the gospel of God to you without charge? 8 I robbed other churches by taking wages *from them* to serve you; 9 and when I was present with you and was in need, I was not a burden to anyone; for when the brethren came from Macedonia they fully supplied my need, and in everything I kept myself from being a burden to you, and will continue to do so.

- δέως
- hēdeōs
- 1) with pleasure, gladly
- hēdeós: sweetly, gladly
- Original Word: ἡδέως
Part of Speech: Adverb
Transliteration: hēdeós
Phonetic Spelling: (hay-deh'-oce)
Definition: sweetly, gladly
Usage: gladly, pleasantly, with pleasure.
- 2234 *hēdéōs* (an adverb derived from *hēdys*, "sweetly") – properly, sweet; (figuratively) highly agreeable (enjoyable), i.e. *gladly* received because so *sweet* to the beholder.

- spend
- δαπανᾷω
- dapanaō
- 1) to incur expense, expend, spend
- 2) in a bad sense: to waste, squander, consume
- dapanaó: to spend, spend freely
- Original Word: δαπανᾷω
Part of Speech: Verb
Transliteration: dapanaó
Phonetic Spelling: (dap-an-ah'-o)
Definition: to spend, spend freely
Usage: I spend, bear expense, waste, squander.
- 1159 *dapanáō* – properly, to spend (expend); (figuratively) spending one's money, time, energy, resources, etc.; (passive) become spent, (consumed by); "to exert great effort in doing something"

- be expended
- ἐκδαπανᾶω
- ekdapanaō
- 1) to exhaust by expending, to spend wholly, use up
- 2) to spend one's self wholly
- ekdapanaó: to expend wholly, i.e. to exhaust
- Original Word: ἐκδαπανᾶω
 Part of Speech: Verb
 Transliteration: ekdapanaó
 Phonetic Spelling: (ek-dap-an-ah'-o)
 Definition: to expend wholly, to exhaust
 Usage: I spend (give out) completely, exhaust.
- 1550 *ekdapanáō* (from 1537 /ek, "completely out" and 1159 /dapanáō, "spend") – properly, "*spent,*" *completely used up* (used only in 2 Cor 12:15).
